The SNOWPLOW Finally Arrives!

After two years, 10 months and 5 days since the Russell snowplow was donated to the French Creek Valley Railroad Historical Society, it finally is in Meadville. The former Delware Lackawanna & Western Railroad snowplow #95904 rode on the back end of a Meadville-bound freight on July 20. It actually was within 2 1/2 miles the night before, but the crew had to outlaw before Stan Road, north of Meadville. What started as a donation from the Growth Resources of Wellsboro (PA) in September 2015 proved with time, patience, and the ability to raise funds, the FCVRRHS would not give up until the 73 year old snowplow got to Meadville. Transportation of the unit was the biggest problem. Several attempts to have it hauled over the road by trucking companies were thwarted by the expense or availability of the proper trailers. Originally, the FCVRRHS planned to have it hauled over Norfolk Southern and the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroads, but a snafu with the NS ended that until a second attempt to arrange transportation with the aforementioned railroads succeeded. The snowplow was loaded at Wellsboro by Williamsport Crane on a TTX-owned flatcar, transported to Corning by the Wellsboro & Corning Railroad, then hauled to Buffalo by the Norfolk Southern. Baggage Car Sold

The French Creek Valley Railroad Historical Society has sold its baggage car.

A deal with Mr. Allen Maples of the Everett Railroad was officially approved by the board at a special meeting on August 9. The former Pennsylvania Railroad class B60b #9035 last was owned by the WNYP Railroad and Conrail before them. Conrail used it in their maintenance of way department as a tool car in Oil City, PA. The FCVRRHS had planned to restore it as Conrail #64658 and paint it m-o-w yellow to go with the snowplow. It became impractical to keep this car due to circumstances beyond control of the board. Mr. Maples is planning to restore and operate the baggage car on the **Everett Railroad. The Everett** Railroad is a tourist line that regularly runs between Hollidaysburg and Martinsville, PA, and operates ALCO-built 2-6-0 #11.

Announcements of Everett Railroad excursions have graced the back cover in several issues of your Valley Express.

B&LE Freight Station

According to the minutes of the August 16, 2018 membership meeting, the status of the Bessemer and Lake Erie Railroad freight station, most recently the Meadville Farm & Garden, is still in limbo. The trustee is asking a slightly lower price since the dispersal auction this summer. There were no qualifying bids to purchase the station and surrounding property, though the

Budget & Finance

The French Creek Valley Railroad Historical Society has submitted its entry for Trains Magazine Preservation Award. The award would defray costs of setting the DL&W Russell snowplow on display on a lot across from the railroad display site in Pomona Park, Meadville, PA. Costs include materials, such as gravel and ballast, and services such as crane operators and equipment to lift the snowplow onto the display track. Rick Rowlands, of the Youngstown Steel Heritage Museum, has offered his and his crew's services, at no charge, to build the display track.

The winner of the Preservation Award is to be announced November 10th.

Museum

Progress on the Trolley Station continues. This year 132 roof rafter tails were replaced and painted, a new floor was installed in the back room, a contract was signed for the installation of new gutters and downspouts, and we are preparing a contract for the large multi-paned window in the back room to be replaced. A new storage building was purchased from the Crawford County Career and Technical Center and

moved to our property. Quiring Brothers Paving has marked the location for a new paved parking lot on the west side of the building.

The Trolley Station was open Saturdays from 1:00 PM until 4:00 PM. Seven docents took turns staffing the building and also were available to open and close the station for special events.

Regular organizations that use the space include the Cambridge Springs Kiwanis Club twice a month and the National Model Railroaders Association for general meetings and board meetings.

A number of private parties and a high school class reunion were held at the Trolley Station this year.

The Heritage Partnership Annual Meeting was held on Monday, September 17, at the Trolley Station. C.L. Siebert, Jr. received (Posthumously) the 2018 Anne Stewart Historical Researcher Award for his work writing Northwestern Pennsylvania Railway. The award will be sent to his son, Dr. Karl Siebert. Kenneth Springirth was the meeting's featured speaker.

New merchandise is now for sale including conductors' hats and wooden trolley car kits that include paint. Should you want a personal tour of the station or are interested in using it for a private function please call Dan at 720-4869 or Sandy at 282-6449.

The former Meadville Farm and Garden building has not sold. The Heritage Partnership with FCVRRHS currently have the highest offering but the seller has not accepted it.

Property and Equipment

A lot has happened since the last issue of the Valley Express. The snowplow has arrived, but has yet to be placed on display. Work is progressing to do just that. The lot was graded, with a dirt and gravel base added on September 14, and a first layer of ballast was spread on the 20th of September. Another layer will follow soon. Members of the Youngstown Steel Heritage Museum will travel to Meadville to build the track panels for the snowplow. Ties, rails and all the necessary hardware is being gathered to have it ready to

build.

The Bessemer and Lake Erie boxcar restoration is almost complete. The west side door has been rebuilt, and painted, while some areas on the side have been painted with primer. A quick final coat of paint and lettering on the doors should complete the project.

The headlight on the #518 was wired up by Terry Martin, who at last report was in the hospital. We are all thinking of you, Terry. Get well soon.

As reported on the front page, the baggage car was sold. Due to all the projects currently in progress, it wasn't feasible to keep it, restore it, and move it onto the display track with the snowplow, which had to be done soon. Fortunately, Mr. Allen Maples of the Everett Railroad was interested enough to purchase it.

The caboose is still in need of interior electricity and a good exterior washing and waxing. The need for electricity stems from hot summer days during the tours and a possible trick-or-treat night at Halloween.

On The Side Track

The Extra 3639 North Project

The Youngstown Steel Heritage Foundation is pleased to announce that an agreement has been reached with the Virginia Museum of Transportation to purchase former Erie Lackawanna SDP45 diesel locomotive No. 3639, currently painted as Conrail No. 6670, currently located at Roanoke, VA.

The YSH has initiated a fund-raising drive with an initial goal of \$20,000 to purchase and secure the locomotive. Additional fund-raising will take place in 2019 to move the locomotive to the Marter Yard Railroad Museum operated by the Mahoning Valley Railroad Heritage Association.

After arrival at Marter Yard, the SDP45 will remain in Conrail paint for a period of time before finally being repainted as Erie Lackawanna

No. 3639.

After years of watching this locomotive sit in the yard, now is our chance to provide it with a better future and bring it back to northeast Ohio, the former hub of the Erie Lackawanna Railway.

The locomotive is in generally good condition despite missing several major components including the main generator, traction motors, and air compressor. An operational restoration is a long term goal of the project.

Members of the FCVRRHS may be familiar with this locomotive, as it is the same locomotive that the Northwestern Pennsylvania Railroad & Tooling Heritage Center (now the Northwestern Pennsylvania Heritage Partnership), of which the FCVRRHS is a partner, attempted to acquire.

Buffalo, the snowplow was tagged with graffiti, which was later removed after its arrival in Meadville. The #95904 was then hauled to Salamanca, NY by the B&P. The WNYP picked it up and transported it to Olean, where crews off-loaded at their shops.

It currently sits on a siding in Meadville, waiting for day when it is placed on display across from the display site in Pomona Park. That day will be soon, as circumstances dictate the immediacy to have it placed on display.



NS Testing Rebuilt Loco on WNYP

Norfolk Southern has been testing a rebuilt GE locomotive on the WNYP recently. NS AC44C6CF #8520 was a Dash 9-40CW that was converted from DC to AC. This locomotive is hard to miss, as it is gray with black lettering on the long hood, and red and black with white lettering on the cab. It has been testing on the WNYP's old Pennsylvania RR line from Olean along with NS C40-8.5W #8501 and #8513. Both of the latter units were also rebuilt. It was reported at the September membership meeting that the WNYP has no interest in these locomotives, so ALCO fans, you can sleep better at night.
